## Oxford University Yacht Club, Risk Assessment – Racing 2020/2021

Date: May 2020

## **Key Points:**

- This is a generic risk assessment for all UK based OUYC racing weekends
- All members to have signed an Oxford University Yacht Club Membership Form/Next of Kin form before using any boat.
- All members to be informed of location of Oxford University Good Practice Guidelines and Risk Assessment upon joining OUYC.
- Any member with a potentially serious medical condition should alert the crew before the trip commences or they leave shore. See OUYC Safety Rules and Regulations.
- All injuries/accidents must be reported by a member of ASO following a trip out of Oxford.

This document is to give skippers (Activity Leaders) and crew guidelines. It does not stipulate detailed emergency procedures, as these will be left up to the expertise and knowledge of the skipper and crew.

At the start of every trip the skipper (Activity Leader) will give the crew a full safety briefing. Novices should have a briefing before the trip commences.

Scale 1-5, with 5 being the most severe

Drivers must comply with the Highway Code when in the UK.</li> <li>OUYC to have telephone numbers of the Hire Company and the Area Safety Officer (Sport). All accidents to be reported to the University Security Services on (01865) 289999 and and Sports Safety Office, David White on 07866 366855 as soon as practicable.</li> <li>ASO as soon as is practicable. Any accident involving a hire vehicle to be reported to Hire Company as soon as is possible.</li> </ul>	1 x 4	Vehicle being hired through the Sports Federation Travel Scheme. A copy of the Certificate for Motor Insurance is to be carried in the vehicle at all times.
Road accidents in private vehicles.	Follow guidance of Emergency Services. Individuals to exchange Insurance documents. All accidents to be reported to the University Security Services on (01865) 289999 and Sports Safety Office, David White on 07866 366855 as soon as is practicable	1 x 4	
Drugs and Alcohol	<ul> <li>Non-prescribed drugs are prohibited.</li> <li>Alcohol consumption limited to reasonable levels</li> <li>A committee member will remain sober at all times in case of emergencies.</li> </ul>	1 x 4	
Accidents on the quayside e.g. slipping and falling.	Experienced sailors help novices.	1 x 2	
Equipment failure	<ul> <li>The Skipper should not allow the boat to leave if insufficient equipment is supplied.</li> <li>Emergency procedures and equipment will be addressed in the safety briefing.</li> </ul>	1 x 5	A boat check should be carried out by the OA, checking that all safety equipment is present, and as far as can be determined is in working order.
Boat structure and equipment deficiency	The Skipper should not allow the boat to leave if they believe insufficient safety equipment is supplied.	1 x 5	
Personal injury	<ul> <li>Wherever possible, OUYC is to ensure there is a qualified first aider in board.</li> <li>OUYC will provide a First Aid Kit if not provided by the OA</li> </ul>	3 x 3	In the case of a serious injury the crew must return to shore as soon as possible. If VHF radio on board, inform the coastguard/OA immediately or as soon as possible on return to shore.

Cold – leading to Hypothermia	<ul> <li>Appropriate warm clothing to be worn e.g. hats etc.</li> <li>Compulsory for windproof/waterproof clothing to be available for use on board.</li> <li>Warm drinks to be available.</li> <li>OUYC to carry at least one sleeping bag when racing in case of crew coldness.</li> </ul>	3 x 4	Before all trips, the crew are to be advised to bring appropriate clothing. The crew must try to prevent immersion. Crew knowledgeable about signs of Hypothermia. Information provided in skippers briefing.
Hot – Sunstroke/Sunburn/dehydration	<ul> <li>Appropriate clothing to be worn e.g. hats, sunglasses.</li> <li>Limit exposure time in the sun where possible.</li> <li>Regular intake of fluids.</li> <li>Use of suntan lotion.</li> </ul>	3 x 3	Before all trips, the crew are to be advised to bring appropriate clothing. The crew must try to prevent immersion. Crew knowledgeable about signs of Sunstroke, sunburn or dehydration. Information provided in skippers briefing.
Seasickness	<ul> <li>Recognise symptoms of seasickness.</li> <li>Keep hydrated.</li> <li>Take medication where suitable.</li> </ul>	3 x 2	
Head injury from boom	Activity Leaders should carry out a thorough safety briefing for novices at the start of each event.	2 x 5	On land briefing before each event for novices, including basic teaching video, covering all the possible hazards on a boat.
Drowning	<ul> <li>Compulsory wearing of Life jackets for non-swimmers.</li> <li>All crew members to wear Lifejackets in deteriorating weather conditions.</li> <li>All crew members to be clear of 'MOB' procedure.</li> <li>Written procedures to be in place and safety briefing to cover such procedures.</li> </ul>	1 x 5	All members should be able to swim 100m. Prevent immersion where possible.
Winching and rope work – finger trapping	Briefing on how to use a winch.	1 x 3	
Mast ascending	<ul> <li>Two halyards must be used – at least one tied on.</li> <li>Activity Leader to supervise winching</li> </ul>	1 x 3	
Sailing Hazards e.g. sudden changes in wind strength, fog etc	<ul> <li>Before all trips accurate reports of the weather for the trip must be assessed. A decision is then made as to whether to sail or not.</li> <li>Avoid sailing in poor visibility.</li> <li>Strong recommendation to wear life jackets and harnesses in bad weather.</li> <li>Ensure crew/boat/equipment is suitable for all weather conditions.</li> </ul>	3 x 4
